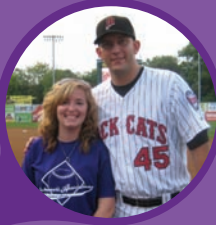

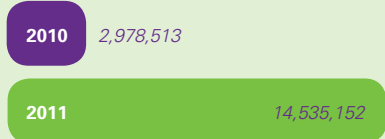

Together we have made astonishing progress in advancing the goals of the FY09-FY11 strategic plan and we take tremendous pride in what we have done. We are excited about the advances we have made together and are inspired by this success to continue to move our mission forward. Increasing Concern and Awareness of the Disease and the Association:

Key to advancing our cause is to increase awareness of the Association, the services we provide, our research activities and the effect of Alzheimer's on our nation. In so doing we can increase the number of people we can help and who can help us move our mission forward.

Connecticut Media Impressions

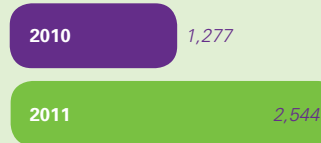


This year, in Connecticut, we increased our presence in the media by 488% over FY 10. Nationally, in FY09-FY11, we captured 6.4 billion media impressions and more than doubled unaided awareness of our Association.

Advancing Advocacy: Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States. We must advocate for the needs and rights of people with Alzheimer's and their families. This year we recruited four Alzheimer's Ambassadors representing four of Connecticut's five congressional districts. Ambassadors work directly with their congressmen and women to increase funding for research and advance legislation to assist people affected by Alzheimer's. In Connecticut, our advocates led the charge in maintaining funding for the Alzheimer's Connecticut State Respite Program and worked hard on a campaign which resulted in the passage of a very important piece of legislation: An Act Concerning Criminal Background Checks for Employees of Homemaker-Companion and Home Health Agencies. At the National level, our advocates worked to pass the National Alzheimer's Project Act which will create, for the first time, a plan to address Alzheimer's in America.

Enhancing Care and Support: Central to our mission is to provide care and support to those affected by Alzheimer's disease. The Connecticut Chapter provides an array of services to support caregivers, including care consultation, information and referral services on our Helpline, education programs and support groups. In FY 11 we increased our Helpline calls by 99%, our care consultations by thirteen-fold, our support group participants by 92% and trained 7,921 individuals on how to best care for those with Alzheimer's.

Growing Revenue Support of the Mission: The Connecticut Chapter increased its Walk revenues by 14.9% over FY 10 levels and ended the year with total revenues of \$1,995,623, inclusive of donated services, with a surplus of \$54,684.

Accelerating Research: The Alzheimer's Association is the leading non-profit funder of Alzheimer's disease research. In Connecticut, the Alzheimer's Association recently awarded Min Wang, Ph.D., of Yale University a New Investigator Research Grant (NIRG) \$99,105 over two years for: "Nicotinic Alpha7-NMDA Receptor Interactions in the Aged Nonhuman Primate."

The shortage of volunteers for Alzheimer's clinical trials is significantly slowing research progress as recruiting and retaining trial participants is critical to developing new Alzheimer's treatments. The Connecticut Chapter promoted TrialMatch™, a free service that makes it easy for caregivers, people with Alzheimer's, families and physicians to locate clinical trials based on personal criteria and location. Some 160 Connecticut residents contacted TrialMatch™ in FY11.

None of this could have been achieved without your commitment and passion for our cause. Please accept our sincere appreciation for all that you have done and continue to do to make a world without Alzheimer's the legacy we leave for the next generation.

In his law practice as a partner with the Stamford firm of Cacace, Tusch, & Santagata, Richard Fisher has worked with a number of clients who are facing Alzheimer's disease. So when he was approached by a client who was interested in starting a Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, he readily accepted the task, and was instrumental in starting the Fairfield County Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, where he served as board president. The Fairfield County Chapter provided much-needed programs and services to the residents in the southwestern part of the state, and executed the first formal education conference in the region.



Richard has remained active throughout the years as mergers created a state-wide Chapter of the Association. He has served on the public policy, strategic planning, governance, compensation, and finance committees of the Association, as well as serving as board chair from 2009-2010. Richard has volunteered at the annual Walk in Norwalk every year since its inception, missing only one (because of unbreakable travel plans). He has traveled to Washington, DC to meet with members of the Connecticut Congressional Delegation to help advance critical Alzheimer's legislation.

Richard lives with his wife Rosalea, a retired Stamford teacher in Stamford. In addition to being active with the Association, he has been involved on the boards of the Jewish Home for the Elderly, Stamford Symphony, and Temple Beth El. He also participates with the Connecticut Bar Association as a member of the Executive Committees of the Elder Law Section and the Estates & Probate Section. His goal staying involved with the Association remains the same, saying: "I want to stay involved as long as I can until we find a cure, and at this point I want to continue to pursue that goal."

Elinor Wilber, a state representative for many years representing the town of Fairfield, retired from the legislature to care for her husband who had Alzheimer's disease. Elinor was approached in 1994 to join the public policy committee for the Fairfield County Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, and she graciously agreed.

The committee had identified two major legislative goals: to train law enforcement officials on how to recognize and deal with individuals with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias and to initiate a program to provide respite care for family members caring at home for loved ones with dementia. Elinor was instrumental in getting the House to enter a bill to train Connecticut police departments, which passed successfully. Elinor also worked closely with members of all three chapters after former state Senator Robert Genuario, now Superior Court Judge Genuario, submitted a bill at their behest which led to the creation of the Statewide Respite Care Program in 1998. This program has helped thousands of individuals get the vital support they need.

Over the years, Elinor testified many times at hearings in Hartford, attended the National Alzheimer's Public Policy Forum in Washington, DC for many years, and has been an outstanding advocate for the Alzheimer's Association. Elinor's friend, Julia Bronder, commented, "Elinor gave us the tools necessary to persuade legislators about the importance of our cause. She was, and still is, widely regarded at the Capitol and remembered there for being one of the most effective and ethical members of that body."

A longtime former resident of Fairfield, Elinor now lives in Bridgeport. She is active in her church, also volunteering weekly at its thrift shop, has a devoted circle of friends and is constantly in touch with, and a support for, her four children, many grandchildren and two little great-grandchildren.

After growing up in rural Pigs Eye, South New Jersey, Jerry Kristafer began his radio career in high school with a weekend radio show on a small local station, providing a break from the daily tasks of his farm life. Over the years, Jerry's career has taken him to Pittsburgh, New Haven, and Hartford, with the majority of his time spent at 102.9 DRC-FM in Hartford. Dozens of local and statewide charitable agencies and civic organizations have honored Jerry for his dedication to community service during his nearly 35 years on the air here in Connecticut. According to Jerry, the charity work that he has done has been the most rewarding part of his career: "The best part about what I do is that it gives me the opportunity to help other people, I am a firm believer that we are here to help others, even if it just one person."



But Jerry's passion for the Alzheimer's cause is personal. His uncle passed away from Alzheimer's disease and his half-brother and aunt are currently battling the disease. Over the last few years he knew that he could do more: "You realize what a big concern Alzheimer's is for my generation, and you have a vested interest in supporting this." Jerry has been the Emcee for the Walk to End Alzheimer's in Enfield for the last four years, playing an integral role in increasing the number of participants at that location. Two years ago, working with North Central Regional Director Patty O'Brian, Jerry agreed to Emcee and have DRC-FM sponsor a comedy night to benefit the Chapter as a way to raise awareness and garner new supporters. The evening was so successful it is now an annual event, and something he is particularly proud of: "You can make a better connection with new supporters of the Alzheimer's disease cause with an event like the comedy night." Jerry has two sons: his younger son is graduating from Central Connecticut State University and has a very successful mobile dj business; and his older son is married and a dad. "Papa Jerry" has two granddaughters and a grandson. He is a longtime New York Yankees fan.

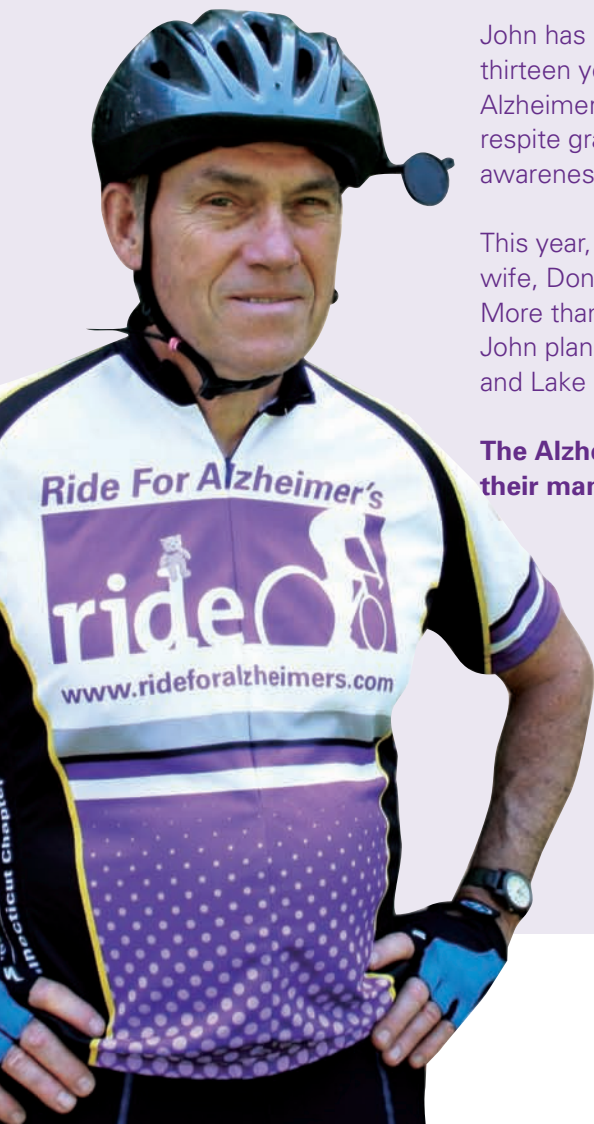
In 1999, John Clark's sister Jeanne, who lives in North Sullivan, Maine, was the caregiver for their mother, Ruth Clark, who had been diagnosed years earlier with Alzheimer's disease.

"I knew then that I also had to step up and do something," said John. The Ride For Alzheimer's was born! It was intended to be a one-time long-distance cycling effort in which John hoped to raise \$5,000. Hundreds of donors responded, and he raised more than \$6,600. The only option was to continue.

John has cycled over 14,000 miles on a variety of rides across the US and Canada. His thirteen year effort has now raised more than \$200,000. All monies raised help the Alzheimer's Association Connecticut Chapter provide funds for caregiver support, respite grants, Medic Alert® and Alzheimer's Association Safe Return®, educational awareness and research.

This year, due to John's cancer diagnosis, he was not able to do an actual ride. John's wife, Donna, encouraged him to do the mailing anyway. They set a goal of \$18,000. More than 300 donors later, they passed that goal in late September. Next summer John plans to get back on the road to do a fifteen-day, 1,200 mile ride around Lake Erie and Lake Ontario.

Ann Schoeler spends a lot of time running after her three-year-old granddaughter Riley, who she cares for a few days per week. She also spends a lot of time researching Younger-Onset Alzheimer's to learn as much as she can. A retired training consultant from a large insurance provider, Ann began to notice small changes in her own behavior — starting with difficulty with language and symptoms of depression. A sister and a friend encouraged her to go to her doctor, who ordered additional tests — providing her with the diagnosis at age 59. “When you get that news, it is pretty lonely” says Schoeler.

Together with her husband, Norm, Ann met with Maria Tomasetti, Alzheimer's Association Connecticut Chapter's South Central Regional Director, who provided her with resources for her to begin learning about her options. “I wanted to find out as much as I could about it” says Ann. Over the last two years, Ann and Norm have attended family training seminars, support groups and the chapter's annual education conference to gain additional knowledge. They also take an active role in learning about the latest in clinical trials. “I live my life as if I don't have it; there's a lot of frustration that comes with that,” says Ann.



Ann has created a document for her family called *Treat Me Right*, instructing her loved ones not to treat her like she's sick. She says that this has been very helpful to her ten siblings, who all have been very supportive. Both Ann and Norm are active in the AMC Hiking Club chapter in Connecticut and lead hikes throughout the state year-round. They have a personal goal of wanting to hike the 48 mountain summits in New Hampshire, and have completed 30 thus far. You have got to have something ahead of you” says Ann. “In my heart, I want to live ten years. In my head, I'm thinking four years.” Living in the moment and enjoying their family is how they are living now. “I'm willing to do whatever it takes, I know she'd do the same for me,” says Norm.
