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The Alzheimer's Association Hosts a Special Essay Reading and Discussion of *The Shriver Report: A Woman's Nation Takes on Alzheimer's*

- Join the National Conversation during National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month -

(Coralville, IA) – This November, join the national conversation about women and Alzheimer's disease during National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month as the Alzheimer's Association hosts a special essay reading and discussion of *The Shriver Report: A Woman's Nation Takes on Alzheimer's* on November 16, 2010 at the Coralville Public Library. The event will begin at 6:30 p.m. *The Shriver Report* is a groundbreaking, comprehensive examination of the impact of Alzheimer's disease on American women as caregivers, advocates and people living with the disease.

The event will include readings of essays by Debbie Jones, Alzheimer's Association National Board of Directors and Wally Chappell, former University of Iowa Hancher Auditorium Director from *The Shriver Report: A Woman's Nation Takes on Alzheimer's*, followed by a discussion panel led by Tim Seymour, KGAN/CBS 2 news reporter and anchor and panelists Kelly Hauer, Executive Director, Alzheimer's Association East Central Iowa, Steven Anderson Ph.D., Associate Professor of Neurology, University of Iowa Memory Disorders Clinic, Gary Wicklund, Executive Director, Capricorn Research and Ann Haugland, University of Iowa Hawkeye's Fighting Alzheimer's student organization advisor.

In partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, *The Shriver Report: A Woman's Nation Takes on Alzheimer's* continues the examination of women. The fact is most women are workers and caregivers. Women are the overwhelming majority of the more than 11 million caregivers for people with Alzheimer's or other dementias and they comprise 65 percent of those living with the disease.

The purpose of the Alzheimer's Association essay reading of *The Shriver Report: A Woman's Nation Takes on Alzheimer's* is to better understand this epidemic and encourage further discussions about Alzheimer's here and in communities across the country.
