As we approach our twenty-fifth year as an organization, we realize that the surest path to the accomplishment of **Our Vision of a world without Alzheimer's** lies in preventing the disease.



To that end the Alzheimer's Association, through the generosity of our donors, has awarded more than \$200 million in research grants since 1982. And, while we are heartened by many promising developments, we realize that much remains to be done.

In the meantime, we understand that for the millions of people currently affected by Alzheimer's disease, the future is now. They need someone to care, someone to offer advice and assistance, someone to direct them to the best medical care, someone to train their caregivers, and someone who will advocate for them on both the local and national levels.

We at the Greater Indiana Chapter are here for that very purpose. **Our Mission is to eliminate Alzheimer's disease through the advancement of research; to provide and enhance care and support for all affected; and to reduce the risk of dementia through the promotion of brain health.**

The year 2005–2006 produced several exciting “firsts” for the Greater Indiana Chapter. We developed our first comprehensive **Caregiver Guide** that has been widely accepted and praised by both family and professional caregivers. We conducted our first annual **Family Caregiver Conference** in Indianapolis. We partnered with the National Urban League to develop a pilot program on Alzheimer’s disease for African Americans. We conducted a research pilot study to measure behavior change in caregivers after receiving one or more of our core services. Data analysis of outcomes will guide the organization in determining which of our core services are of most value.

We expanded a wide variety of our education programs to include new audiences, both healthcare professionals and families. Attendance at the **Family Education Programs** grew at the rate of forty-three percent while our **Speaker’s Bureau**, a part of our **Community Education Program**, saw a forty percent increase in participants.

We brought our **Partnering with Your Doctor Program** to our **Support Group** network to help patients and their caregivers learn how to more effectively work with their physicians to ensure that they receive the best health care possible. We took our **Maintain Your Brain Program** into more businesses as “lunch and learn” programs.

In addition, we continued our **Project Share Program**, an eight-week support group designed for persons with early stage Alzheimer’s disease, so that they may meet with peers in a safe and accepting environment. A “graduate” group that meets monthly has also formed.

Our **24/7 Helpline**, a vital service, because it is often a caller’s first experience with our organization, provided information to more than 5,000 people during the year, a sixteen percent increase over the prior year. We added four new volunteers to our Helpline team.

The **Helpline** referred families in need of the services of our licensed social worker to participate in our **Care Consultation Program**. Consequently, those services increased 116 percent.

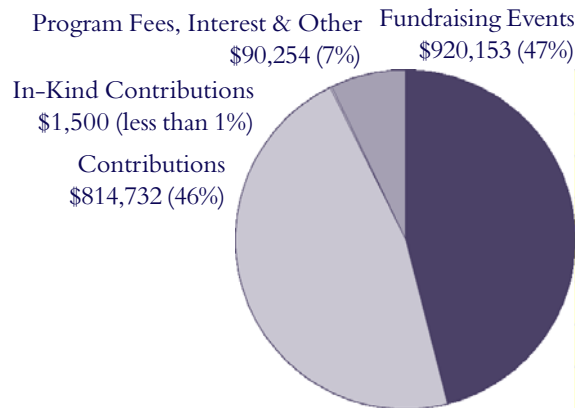
In our ongoing effort to **Advocate** for all who are affected by Alzheimer’s, we increased membership in our **ALERT! Network** by more than 320 people who help us keep our cause and the need for funding in front of government officials.



The generosity of our donors enables us to continue to provide these invaluable services and fund research as we work to eliminate Alzheimer's disease. In our continuing effort to be good stewards of the gifts we receive, in fiscal year 2006 78% of our expenditures provided programs and services to those affected by Alzheimer's disease.

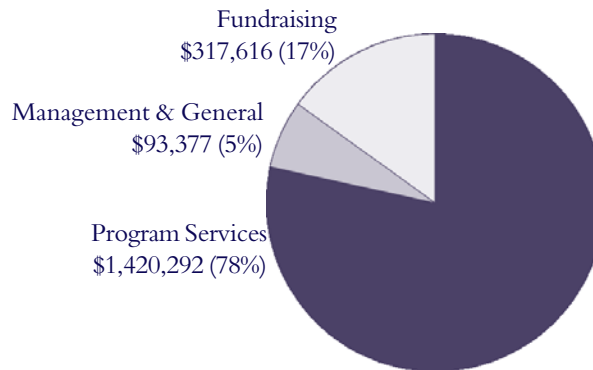
