From I-90 East or West

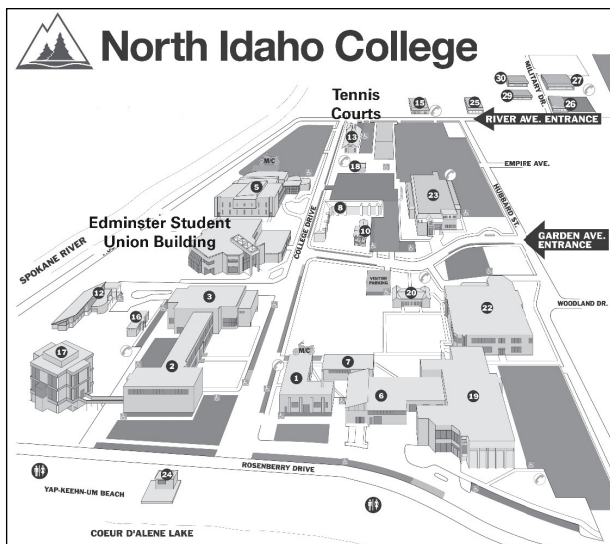
Take the Northwest Boulevard exit (Exit 11) from I-90 and go south on Northwest Boulevard. Go approximately 1.8 miles to the second stop light (you will see a large North Idaho College readerboard on your right). Turn right onto Mullan Road. Turn left at West Garden Avenue and after two city blocks you will enter the NIC campus.

From Highway 95 North

After crossing Appleway continue to proceed south on Hwy. 95. Stay in the right lane and follow the signs to Moscow. Before crossing the bridge over the Spokane River turn left onto Northwest Boulevard, following the signs to City Center. Go approximately 1/2 mile to the first stop light (you will see a large North Idaho College readerboard on your right). Turn right onto Mullan Road. Turn left at West Garden Avenue and after two city blocks you will enter the NIC campus.

From Highway 95 South

After crossing the Spokane River turn right onto Northwest Boulevard, following the signs to North Idaho College. Go approximately 1/2 mile to the first stop light (you will see a large North Idaho College readerboard on your right). Turn right onto Mullan Road. Turn left at West Garden Avenue and after two city blocks you will enter the NIC campus.

Teepa Snow is an occupational therapist currently serving as education director and lead trainer for the Eastern North Carolina Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association. She is also a counseling associate for the Duke University School of Nursing. She has more than 25 years' experience in the field of geriatrics. She worked as the director of the OTA Program at the Durham Technical Community College for 10 years. She was also a clinical associate professor at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. She was the OT director in a head injury facility, a clinical specialist in geriatrics at a Veteran's Administration medical center and has worked as a restorative care coordinator for long-term care facilities. She has been a direct care provider in community, long term care and rehabilitation sites. Teepa has received local, statewide, and national recognition for her expertise in geriatrics, dementia care, functional abilities, and individual care.

Marty Richards has been a social worker and teacher for more than 35 years. Receiving her masters of social work degree from the University of Washington in 1970, she has spent her career working in the community, in long-term care facilities, and in institutions of higher learning. Marty has worked with individuals and families and has also been a community educator. She frequently makes presentations at professional forums and within the religious community. Marty is a State of Washington Licensed Individual Clinical Social Worker. She is a member of the American Society on Aging (Governing Board of the Forum on Religion, Spirituality, and Aging - past Chair); the National Association of Social Workers - Academy of Certified Social Workers; and the National Council on the Aging (Delegate Council National Interfaith Coalition on Aging).
