
DATA FROM THE 2016 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In the District of Columbia, more than half of all adults providing unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's or another dementia have been doing so for at least two years.


Among dementia caregivers, <u>40 percent</u> are in the "sandwich generation" – caring for both someone with dementia and a child or grandchild.

More than half of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide care to their parent or their parent-in-law.
