

New Long Term Care Equality Index (LEI)



Alzheimer's disease-focused registries can provide comprehensive and accurate records of the disease and thus enable better planning for social and medical services, according to a recent article in Frontiers in Aging. Registries also help

identify demographic differences in disease prevalence and foster research into risk factors for Alzheimer's disease. Overall, the article concludes, Alzheimer's disease-focused registries offer a unique opportunity to conduct high-impact, scientifically rigorous research

efficiently. With their potential to inform better planning for social and medical services, these registries are powerful tools for research and public health data.
