

## DATA FROM THE 2013 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Michigan, 12 percent – nearly one in eight – of those aged 45 and over report they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

More than 70 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.

For those with worsening memory problems, more than four in ten say it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities.
